Skills at Scale

In 2002, when we took volunteers to Haiti to build an adoption orphanage, we could not have guessed how that seed of service would grow. Now, 20+ years later, our team is like a hive of worker bees, spreading best practices to care providers in the orphan-care space. We are pollinators, helping individuals connect and share their own ideas with us, which we then share with others.

Our strategy to get orphans into families has evolved over the past 21 years. This past year we discovered how the tools we developed along the way are valuable in a variety of settings beyond orphanages, including promoting foster care and reunifying children with their families. Not only are the tools valuable, but they also have built-in measures to demonstrate their impact.

We've seen that governments pass legislation to help get kids into loving homes, but they need additional help to implement. A Child's Hope is galvanizing a global network of organizations who are involved in the space to accelerate progress for these kids.

As we've forged these relationships over the past 18 months, we've repeatedly heard the same thing from government leaders, orphanage directors, caregivers, and other supporting organizations around the world: **they no longer feel alone in their burdens!**

As organizations continue to ask more from us, we want to be known globally as specialists that can equip those working to help orphaned children, whether a foster parent, an adoptive parent, or a government worker in a developing country.

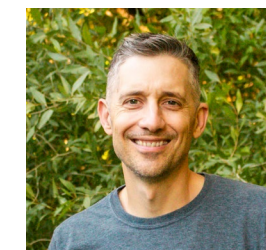
At the heart of what we do, we're finding that the most leveraged and sustainable way to help orphaned children is to build skills for those who are already working with these kids. These are the people making

a huge difference—who could do ten times more good if they were properly equipped and didn't feel alone and burnt out. What's most exciting is that this is a method that scales!

This report shares how we are doing this work in Baja, Mexico, and how we now teach our practical system to our partners around the world. The demand for our assessments, skills-first coaching, and improvement roadmaps is pressuring us to grow, especially since we're working to make it globally accessible. And our existing partners keep asking us one question: **What else do you have for my team?**

Our work now is to become a trusted platform for impact, where anyone wanting to help orphaned and abandoned children can plug in and gain skills, community, resources, and find a hopeful outlook for themselves and for the kids.

2002	3 board members form H.E.L.P. International; renamed A Child's Hope Foundation later that year

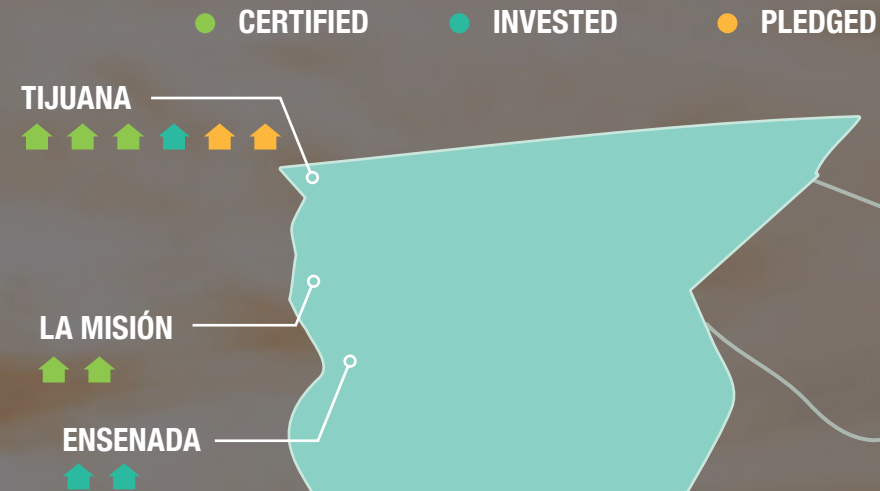
Hope Keeps Growing

Since 2007, the State of Baja California in Mexico has been where our programs are anchored. For 16 years we've tweaked our offerings and tested new programs with a growing number of children's homes in Baja. It is the only location in our global efforts where our Thrive Team members on the ground are paid as A Child's Hope staff. In many ways, our Baja Thrive Team and Orphanage Partners are the model for what is possible with our Deployment Partners and their Children's Homes around the globe. We are encouraged by the results we are seeing in Baja!

Aligning with Global Efforts

The United Nations' 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development provides a plan for shared peace and prosperity. A Child's Hope agrees that ending poverty goes hand-in-hand with the UN's blueprint for improving health, education, and equality.



A Child's Hope Foundation supports the Sustainable Development Goals

As our global partners implement the Thrive Program, they raise the standard of care for orphaned and abandoned children. These children receive their basic needs of shelter, food, and clean water. They have access to education, healthcare, and healing from trauma. These children have real hope for breaking the cycles of poverty, violence, neglect, and inequality that landed them in the orphanage system.

These children will bring hope to a world that needs peace and prosperity for all its people and creations.

Our work to help children thrive and have the means to succeed as adults overlaps with 12 of the UN's Sustainable Development Goals for peace and prosperity.



Care and Leadership Institute

SKILLS AT SCALE



As we've spread our Thrive Program through Deployment Partners around the world, we've seen demand in the orphan care space for **more training**. Most caregivers are uneducated, but have a huge desire to do good and improve their skills. A Child's Hope has a unique opportunity to help these caregivers become professionals. We will define the standards of orphan care around the world, and spread this knowledge through an online platform: **the Care and Leadership Institute.**

We will build an app with online courses, materials, and certification modules that caregivers can access anytime, from their phones, in their own language, at a 7th-grade education level. The app will also host an online community where anyone working in the orphan care space can collaborate and coach each other.



The Care and Leadership Institute will **SCORE** impactful wins for children by elevating their caregivers' capacities.

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Our Programs Drive Change



Courses & Coaching

We educate and coach our partners through our Thrive Program, which gives them a unifying operating system that prioritizes all other offerings.

- Semi-annual Thrive Assessments with each Orphanage Partner
- Custom Improvement Roadmaps that prioritize needs and projects with each Orphanage Partner
- Continuing education grants, courses, and certificates for caregiving and home management
- Ongoing coaching for Deployment Partners, Orphanage Partners, and caregivers
- Certification and annual recertification of our Orphanage Partners as Thrive Certified Homes



Communities

In order to alleviate loneliness in the orphan-care space, we invite leaders of governments and NGOs to join The Collective and solve challenges together.

- Create sub-groups within The Collective to facilitate peer coaching between professionals in similar roles (orphanage directors, government leaders, donors, NGOs)
- Host virtual events (town halls, focus groups)
- Facilitate in-person conferences
- Maintain a directory of organizations that provide resources to children (therapy, education, etc.) so they can connect with each other



Our Programs Drive Change



Volunteering

To inspire lifelong humanitarians, we provide several options for volunteers to get involved.

- Service Trips for individuals, families, and private groups
- Extended Volunteers live at a children's home for several months to provide support and mentorship
- Staff Volunteers fill a variety of administrative needs
- Task Forces are tactical teams that collaborate on a specific project request



Grant Matchmaking

We recruit and match donors to vetted opportunities that make measurable impact in the following categories:

- Immediate Needs - food, medicine, etc.
- Infrastructure Needs - better living conditions
- Long-term Needs/Child Advancement Priorities - education, mental health healing, life skills, family placement, transition to adulthood
- Organizational Needs - develop staff of children's homes, government agencies, and NGO partners
- Systemic Change - equip care providers to meet higher standards, implement policy, and accelerate getting kids into families

Baja Thrive Program

Because of corruption in so many orphanages, donors often question whether their giving reaches the children. We developed our Thrive Program to validate the effectiveness of each home's leadership, which ensures that the children who live there can truly hope for a bright future.



Baja Partners



Nuestra Familia in Tijuana, Mexico, achieved their orphanage certification in June 2022. 18 months later, in December 2023, they were the first home to receive a perfect score in all 15 standards of care. Their 37 children are thriving!

Twice each year our Baja Thrive Team conducts the Thrive Assessment with each Orphanage Partner, which **shows how well the home satisfies 15 standards of care**, drawn from the United Nations' Rights of a Child. The team then works with each home's director/s to customize an Improvement Roadmap, which spells out the next steps toward certification.

The Improvement Roadmap identifies one- and-done projects as well as **ongoing support that will have the most significant impact** in helping the orphanage and its children make progress. With these needs defined, we give grants, knowing that the next assessment and Improvement Roadmap will hold the directors accountable for the use of our donors' funds.

When an orphanage meets requirements, including annual training in trauma care, financial transparency, ongoing therapy for the kids, and an overall thriving measure on the standards of care, **they become A Child's Hope Certified as a trustworthy home where children thrive!**



Impact Through Partners

Loving, yet often-uneducated orphanage leaders no longer have to guess how to raise traumatized children into successful adults. In line with caregivers' goals, our Deployment Partners show them how to apply the 15 standards of childcare defined by our Thrive Assessment. Deployment Partners are key to measurably improving the lives and adult outcomes of all children who pass through any type of care facility, whether that be orphanages, foster homes, daycare, or other forms of childcare.

92hands, our Deployment Partner in Kampala, Uganda, lifts homeless women from the slums, houses them, trains them as caregivers, and pays them to take care of 5 to 7 foster children. In supporting these foster mothers, 92hands uses the Thrive Program to assess and elevate these small homes.

Our Deployment Partners are organizations throughout the world who are already connected to children's homes in their local areas. Our Thrive Program is about training these partners to implement the Thrive Program with their networks of children's homes. We give ongoing support in the form of coaching calls with A Child's Hope Foundation's Programs Team, as well as grants and a community of peers in the childcare space.

Learning from Our Deployment Partners

As our Thrive Program spreads around the world, our partners show us new ways it can be applied. Our Deployment Partner in Nairobi is Child in Family Focus - Kenya (CFFK). CFFK works to turn their partner orphanages into family-style children's homes, but their priority is to transition kids into alternative family care, such as adoption, kinship care, and foster families. They see how the Thrive Program applies in all these situations, and CFFK advises their national leaders who share this goal for all vulnerable children in Kenya.

In cities where children end up on the streets for a variety of reasons, and where government social services can't keep up with the workload, CFFK recognized the need for each orphanage to have its own social worker who could originate birth certificates, process paperwork, and place kids in alternative family care.

Partnering with CFFK additionally taught both our organizations a surprising lesson about family reunification.

In 2023, CFFK's social workers reunited 76 children with their families.

With so many examples of successful reunification, A Child's Hope can take what CFFK's social workers have taught us and share this best practice with all our partners.



Every parent knows the fear of losing a child in a crowded city. That stress escalates when the child can't communicate to help himself. This was the nightmare that the Oweno family faced.

FAMILY REUNIFICATION

In November 2022, Garden of Hope Children's Home received a 12-year-old boy whom they suspected had autism. He had wandered away from his home and was found on the streets of Nairobi. He was unable to verbally communicate and could not identify his family. All he could do was write his name, Natori Oweno*, and the name of his school, Bondeni. Unfortunately, "bondeni" in Swahili means "in the valley", and there are several such schools in Nairobi and its suburbs.

The home's director, Pauline, called several "Bondeni" schools, asking if they knew a boy with his first and last names, but none claimed him. In the meantime, young Natori would pack his bags every morning and wait by Pauline's door, hoping to be taken back home. She felt helpless and distressed for him.

In December 2022, Child in Family Focus used a grant from A Child's Hope to hire Eva, a social worker. Eva quickly discovered that many of the children had been unintentionally separated from their families who still wanted them. For Natori, Eva personally visited all the "Bondeni" schools in the area. Finally, she found the school where the teachers recognized the boy.

On February 1, 2023, Natori Oweno was picked up by the local children's welfare officers and accompanied back to his home for a happy reunion after three months of being lost.

Building Community

NETWORK PARTNER



An organization whose work aligns with at least one part of A Child's Hope's mission. Our Network Partners have access to our tools, resources and each other, as well as monthly learning forums in the The Collective. Most of our partners are in this category, and it includes organizations who may transition to either a Deployment or Supportive Services Partnership.

DEPLOYMENT PARTNER



An organization that trains their staff to administer the Thrive Program in their local context. We give ongoing coaching and financial support to our Deployment Partners as they implement the Thrive Program for all the children's homes they are connected to.

SUPPORTIVE SERVICES PARTNER



An organization that delivers a specific service to children's homes, such as mental health therapy or education support. These partners fulfill needs that are identified by Orphanage Partners working toward their Thrive Certification.

SUPPORTIVE SERVICES PARTNER: BLR

The Books Libraries Reading (BLR) initiative is an interactive program that helps children learn to and love to read. Six of our Orphanage Partners in Baja, Mexico, have adopted the program, which matches books to the child's interests. BLR sources new and used books for their mobile library or for placement at the homes' growing libraries. Reading is encouraged through book parties, posters highlighting the children and the books they've read, rewards, and having adults at the home join in the reading challenges.

This year, children who had never before read a book were part of the 195 kids who read 1,679 books!

A Child's Hope Foundation gave \$13,955 for BLR to purchase books and library supplies.



Networking for Greater Good

In April 2023, together with Mexico's family services, Desarrollo Integral de la Familia (DIF), our Baja Thrive Team hosted the first-ever Hope Training Conference. 121 Orphanage Directors, psychologists, and other leaders in child social services attended the conference. All 7 Baja California municipalities sent a representative, as did 10 DIF teams, 45 orphanage homes, and 4 other organizations in the sector. Our team's relations with DIF have continued to deepen, which has meant better communication and training with orphanage directors, and children's documentation being processed faster to get them into family-style orphanages or placed with their relatives.

The Collective

2023 saw the blooming of an idea to host a network we call The Collective. **This is a group for passionate individuals who want to learn and collaborate in solving the global orphan crisis.** We do this through monthly learning events and through the WhatsApp community of the same name.



ROUNDTABLE

A Collective Roundtable is an event open to the public where we bring subject matter experts together to discuss a specific topic with participants.



TOWN HALL

A Collective Town Hall is an online members-only meet-and-greet geared towards learning about the good work being done around the world.



FOCUS GROUP

A Collective Focus Group is a curated conversation about a specific topic. Often, these Focus Groups pop up due to conversations that happened in a Roundtable or Town Hall.

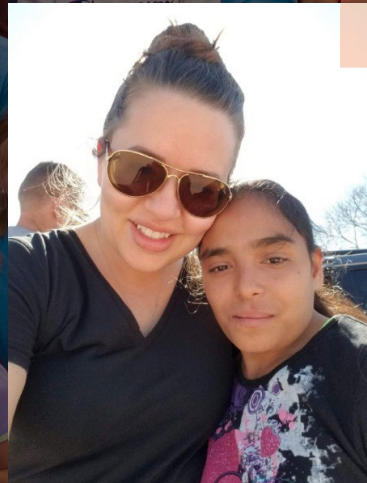


Volunteer Programs

We improve more lives than just those of vulnerable children and their caregivers. Volunteers are a powerful force in our mission to love and serve the children, and they tell us how the work changes their lives as well. In 2023 we hosted our **10,000th service trip volunteer** on one of **42 trips**. We also felt the love from those volunteers who lived at the orphanages for extended periods, and from our large volunteer support staff for our United States headquarters. Our work to give children hope wouldn't be possible without our volunteers!

On the day of their retirement in 2021, Karl and Marsha Stum took their experience raising eight children and drove their van from Vancouver, Washington, to Nuestra Familia Orphanage in Tijuana, Mexico. Their initial commitment was to live onsite for 12 months, to develop a goal-setting program for the teens, and to mentor the 30 children at the home. The Stums chose to extend their volunteer time to December 2023.

EXTENDED VOLUNTEERS: HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE STUMS' 29 MONTHS OF SERVICE

- **Help children experience new activities and establish exercise routines.** They took some of the children hiking, rock climbing, running and even tried parkour. Karl helped them fix flat tires before riding bicycles.
- **Promote children's literacy.** They organized pizza and movie nights to celebrate the kids reaching their reading goals. For the teen girls, they organized a sleepover in the library and cooked breakfast together.
- **Facilitate outings.** The Stums chaperoned kids to participate in school sports, attend their first play, and go shopping at a mall. These outings taught the teens the basics of social transactions, something important to their development as citizens.
- **Mentor children toward adulthood.** They held Plan de Vida meetings to help the children set goals. They counseled with young adults who have aged out of the home to understand how to help the older teens make that transition.
- **Celebrate holidays.** The Stums procured Christmas trees, made sugar cookies with the kids, sewed holiday pageant costumes, and led service projects. They took the teens to serve food at a soup kitchen and distributed 45 fleece blankets made by all the children.
- **Overnight camping.** They led small-group camping expeditions and taught the children about gear, pitching tents, building fires, and cooking outdoors.

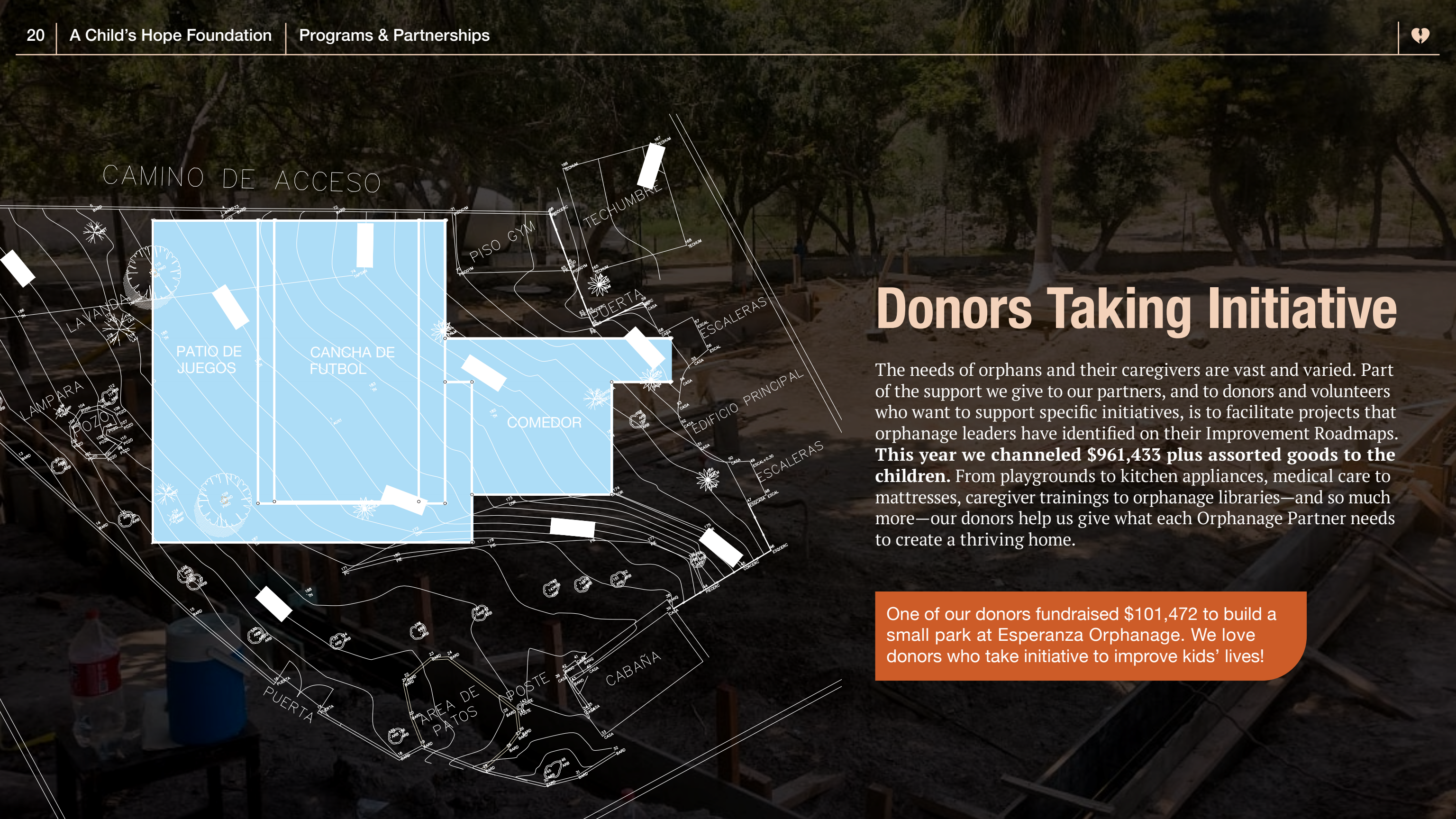
IN KARL & MARSHA'S WORDS...

These children have experienced significant trauma in their lives, including neglect, abandonment, emotional, physical and sexual abuse. These wounds take a long time to heal, and cause children to have little hope and lack of vision for their futures. Their prospects for successful, independent life when they turn 18 are normally not good. We have witnessed that consistent love and nurturing over time heals their hearts so that they believe in themselves and their future. It has been our privilege to love and serve these beautiful children, to help them feel that they truly matter.

This orphanage and many others are doing a wonderful job with limited resources, but rarely have sufficient staff, time, and funds to implement activities and programs. **We recommend other individuals and couples consider becoming extended volunteers where they can make a positive difference in the lives of children.**

We better understand the vision of A Child's Hope Foundation to systematically help orphanages thrive in order to help children heal and thrive. We endorse their efforts toward meaningful interactions with children through volunteer trips, supporting and training orphanage directors and caregivers, and interactions at the government level to enhance policy and programs. We are honored to be associated with A Child's Hope Foundation.

The single most impactful thing we have learned from our experience is that when people show and give love to each other every day, the love of God can be felt in a very palpable way.



The needs of orphans and their caregivers are vast and varied. Part of the support we give to our partners, and to donors and volunteers who want to support specific initiatives, is to facilitate projects that orphanage leaders have identified on their Improvement Roadmaps. **This year we channeled \$961,433 plus assorted goods to the children.** From playgrounds to kitchen appliances, medical care to mattresses, caregiver trainings to orphanage libraries—and so much more—our donors help us give what each Orphanage Partner needs to create a thriving home.

One of our donors fundraised \$101,472 to build a small park at Esperanza Orphanage. We love donors who take initiative to improve kids' lives!



125 mattresses, 227 pillows, and 152 blankets from the Malouf Foundation and the Stirling Foundation were distributed to 6 of our Orphanage Partners in Baja California, Mexico.



\$18,532 was given to increase the salary of 18 babas in Bulgaria. "Baba" means "grandmother", and while this support staff can be men or women of any age, most are older women who put in part-time hours to visit the children, help them with homework, play or read together—babas bring the love!



In April, a teen at Rancho de los Niños was diagnosed with a tumor near his brain that was causing alarming nose bleeds. Within three days, our donors accumulated \$9,681 for his emergency, life-saving surgery. He has fully recovered and is loving life again!

\$480 paid for transportation and registration fees for 15 caregivers from three children's homes in Kenya to attend a Trauma-Informed Childcare training. With almost no previous education about how to respond to trauma, these adults now have skills for helping the children in their care.



To support improved education, we funneled \$465 to help 92hands send 13 youth to secondary school in Uganda. This amount covered their school fees and materials. Some of these children had never been to school before. One teen expressed his thank you in a video, sharing that he is now on his dream path of becoming a veterinary doctor.

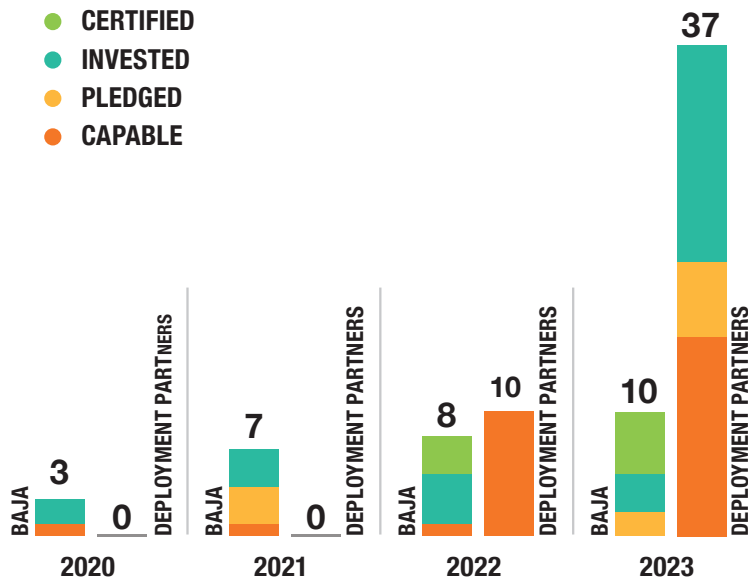

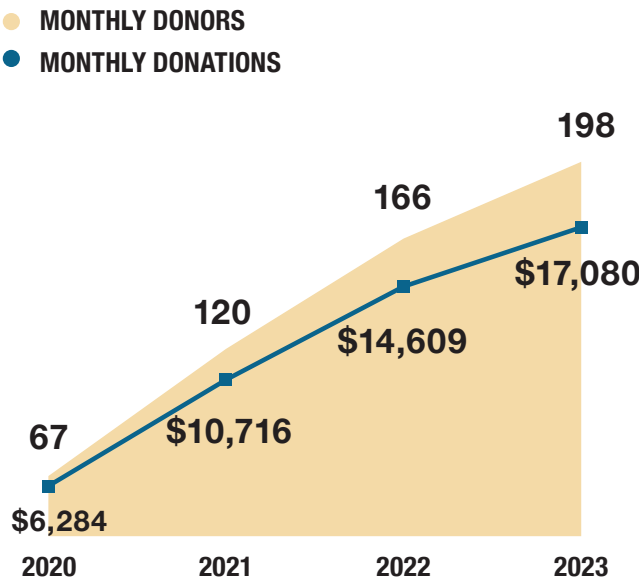

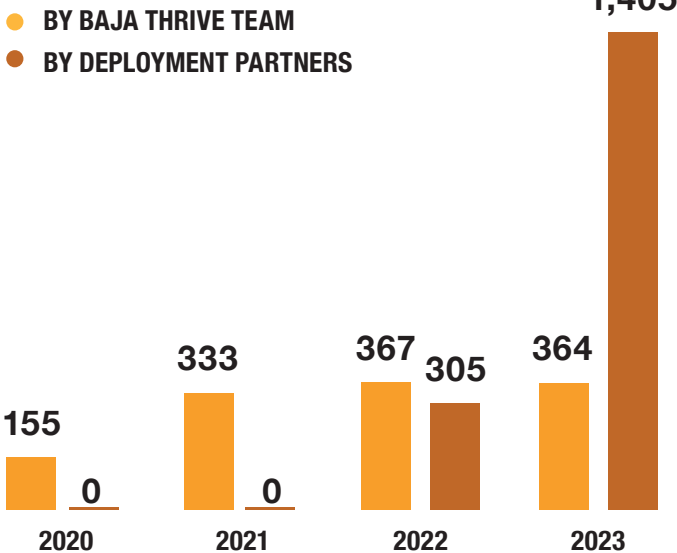
HOMES IN THE THRIVE PROGRAM



MONTHLY DONATIONS

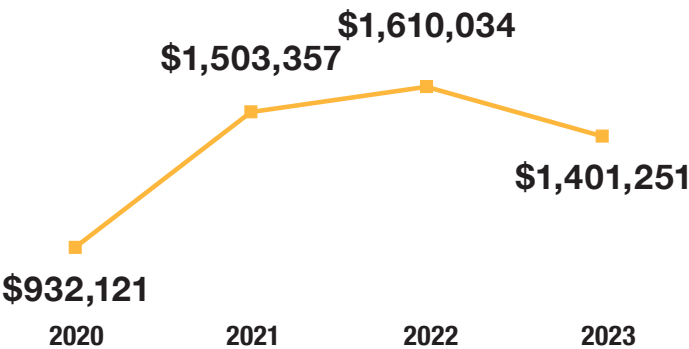
